

In fact, he just recently rewarded both administrators with promotions. This summer (2006), the administrator that gave me the punitive evaluation for my use of the grievance process and open records requests was promoted to Associate Chair of Mathematics.

At a much more significant level, the President was well aware that Georgia Tech's highest elected dispute resolution body, the Faculty Status and Grievance Committee, had unanimously found that the Dean of Sciences "displays a lack of respect for faculty rights and Institute statutes" [fsg02, p 6]. The President was well aware that the Georgia Attorney General's reports of financial misdeeds in the School of Mathematics concluded that the Dean had approved many of the improper travel expenses [ago01, p 2,3,4; ago02, p 1,2]. And the President was well aware of other evidence of that same Dean's heavy-handed managerial style, including threatened use of surveillance cameras and polygraph tests against faculty and staff [dea01]. In spite of all this clear evidence of "lack of respect for faculty rights and Institute statutes", this summer the President selected that same Dean as the new Provost.

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
